

THE (KIN)GDOM

The Revolutionary Jesus (4 of 5)

Over 170 Times

2 Samuel 7:12-14—When your days are over and you rest with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring to succeed you, your own flesh and blood, and I will establish his kingdom. He is the one who will build a house for my Name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever. **I will be his father, and he will be my son.**

Mark 12:35-37—While Jesus was teaching in the temple courts, he asked, “Why do the teachers of the law say that the Messiah is the son of David? David himself, speaking by the Holy Spirit, declared: “The Lord said to my Lord: “Sit at my right hand until I put your enemies under your feet.” David himself calls him ‘Lord.’ How then can he be his son?” The large crowd listened to him with delight.

1 Peter 5:1-4—To the ELDERS among you, I appeal as a FELLOW ELDER and a witness of Christ’s sufferings who also will share in the glory to be revealed: Be SHEPHERDS of God’s flock that is under your care, watching over them—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; NOT LORDING IT OVER THOSE ENTRUSTED TO YOU, but being EXAMPLES to the flock. And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away.

Matthew 6:9-13—This, then, is how you should pray: ‘Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, **your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.** Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into a time of trial (70 CE), but deliver us from the evil one.’

Non-Kyriarchical

Matthew 23:8-12— “But you are NOT to be called ‘Rabbi,’ for you have only one Master and YOU ARE ALL BROTHERS [equal]. And do NOT call anyone on earth ‘father,’ for you have ONE FATHER, and he is in heaven. NOR are you to be called ‘teacher,’ for you have ONE TEACHER, the Messiah. The greatest among you will be your servant. For those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.

Matthew 20:25, 26—Jesus called them together and said, “You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it OVER THEM, and their high officials exercise authority OVER THEM. NOT SO WITH YOU. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant.”

Luke 22:25-26—But he said to them, “The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you.”

Mark 10:42-43—So Jesus called them and said to them, “You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you.”

John 13.12—After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, “Do you know what I have done to you?”

John 15.15—I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends.

Luke 15.1—Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, “This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.”

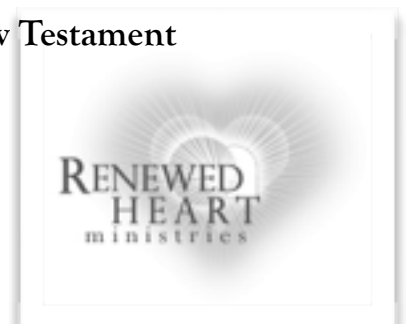
Many Voices; One New World

“THE ONE ANOTHERS”

A Glimpse of the First Century Followers of Jesus

Mark 9.50—Be at peace with each other.

1 Corinthians 11.33—So then, my brothers and sisters, when you gather to eat, you should all eat together.

John 13.14 —Wash one another’s feet.

John 13.34,35—A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.

John 15.12—My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you.

John 15.17—This is my command: Love each other.

Romans 12.10—Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves.

Romans 12.16—Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not think you are superior.

Romans 13.8—Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another.

Romans 14.13—Therefore let us stop passing judgment on one another. Instead, make up your mind not to put any stumbling block or obstacle in the way of a brother or sister.

Romans 14.19—Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification.

Romans 15.5—May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had.

Romans 15.7—Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God.

Romans 15.14—Instruct one another.

Romans 16.16—Greet one another with a holy kiss.

1 Corinthians 12.25—So that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other.

1 Corinthians 16.20—Greet one another with a holy kiss.

2 Corinthians 13.12—Greet one another with a holy kiss.

Galatians 5.13—Serve one another humbly in love.

Galatians 5.15—If you keep on biting and devouring each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other.

Ephesians 4.2—Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love.

Ephesians 4.32—Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Ephesians 5.19—Speaking to one another with psalms, hymns and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord.

Philippians 2.3—Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves.

Colossians 3.13—Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

Colossians 3.16—Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts.

1 Thessalonians 3.12—May the Lord make your love increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else, just as ours does for you.

1 Thessalonians 4.9 —Now about your love for one another we do not need to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love each other.

1 Thessalonians 5.11—Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing.

1 Thessalonians 5.13—Hold them in the highest regard in love because of their work. Live in peace with each other.

1 Thessalonians 5.15—Make sure that nobody pays back wrong for wrong, but always strive to do what is good for each other and for everyone else.

2 Thessalonians 1.3—We ought always to thank God for you, brothers and sisters, and rightly so, because your faith is growing more and more, and the love all of you have for one another is increasing.

Hebrews 3.13—But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called “Today,” so that none of you may be hardened by sin’s deceitfulness.

Hebrews 10.24,25—And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

James 4.11—Brothers and sisters, do not slander one another. Anyone who speaks against a brother or sister or judges them speaks against the law and judges it. When you judge the law, you are not keeping it, but sitting in judgment on it.

James 5.9—Don’t grumble against one another, brothers and sisters, or you will be judged. The Judge is standing at the door!

James 5.16—Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

1 Peter 1.22—Now that you have purified yourselves by obeying the truth so that you have sincere love for each other, love one another deeply, from the heart.

1 Peter 4.8-10—Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God’s grace in its various forms.

1 Peter 5.5—In the same way, you who are younger, submit yourselves to your elders. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another.

1 Peter 5.14—Greet one another with a kiss of love.

1 John 1.7—But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin.

1 John 3.11—For this is the message you heard from the beginning: We should love one another.

1 John 3.23—And this is his command: to believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and to love one another as he commanded us.

1 John 4.7—Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God.

1 John 4.11,12—Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

2 John 5—And now, dear lady, I am not writing you a new command but one we have had from the beginning. I ask that we love one another.

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
